# Superintendent's Report & Lil Husky News by Meredith Feddes

Spring has sprung. Students are working hard to complete the end of year assessments, while staff are trying to keep them in check. SMARTER Balanced assessments will be April 4-8 and makeups will be the following week. Our end of year MAP and DIBELS testing will be May 2-13.

It seems that there are some areas that as a staff we would like to remind our school community of. While we continue to try to teach the children of the community, we are reminded we have gone through two years of emotional rollercoaster and trauma. There are times when our staff have chosen to give grace to students when there is something troubling the students and for that we are fortunate. Absarokee Schools have a resilient, caring and understanding staff. This pandemic has had its toll on our staff through the many changes and as a board and administration we are attempting to give the same grace our staff have. Asking staff to take on every extra duty, while teaching, reteaching, changing plans and new programs and policies has impacted the energy level of our staff as well. If a staff member doesn't seem as they were before please consider giving grace yourself when having conversations with them. Continuing to have conversations is, however, more important than ever. Our students need parents and staff discussing their individual needs and the collective needs of all our students and staff. One item that does not make this better is to have the behind closed-door meetings with a small group or individuals and vent or complain about a topic. Open, honest conversations even when they are hard help solve the problems and needs of our students, staff and district. Through the strategic planning there have been some important topics brought to the school from the community. As we see across the state and nation, educators are leaving the profession in large numbers. To prevent the same thing from happening in our district please remember to give grace, consider having conversations when there is a problem and discuss with the individuals involved not others in the school or community to build trust. Absarokee Schools has a loyal faculty, working on district goals, and building a positive school climate. One Town, One School, One Family.

Our school election will take place on Tuesday, May 3. The election will take place at the polls; however, mail ballots will be sent to those on the list. We are asking the public to continue funding at the current rate through a levy request. This will mean with a passage of the levy we will have a budget of \$1,293,524.21 in the elementary and \$1,098,816.19 in the high school. Should the levy not pass the budget for the elementary would be \$1,259,486.02 and the high school \$1,049,205.02. The levels of funding we were at during the 2021-22 school year were \$1,291,612.70 in the elementary and \$1,091,599.40. As the numbers indicate in order to not cut programs or staff we would need to have the additional funds to maintain our current level. There will also be voting on a 1-year board position and a 3-year board position.

We will work on a final Strategic Planning meeting for the year on April 19<sup>th</sup> in the Elementary Gym. A proposed Strategic Plan will be presented at this meeting and we will take final comments on changes for the plan. This is a 5-year plan that has long range goals for 10-20 years out. If you are unable to attend yet would like to give feedback please email those to <a href="feddesm@absaroke.k12.mt.us">feddesm@absaroke.k12.mt.us</a> or call and share at 328-4581. The final plan will be published in the first newsletter of the 2022-23 school year and on the school website.

Our elementary students will have a Farm Fair held April 21. This will include education on agricultural topics as well as visits from some animals. If you would like to assist please contact Mrs. Donohoe at the school. We encourage parents, grandparents and other family to join us for the afternoon if you are interested in our event.

Kindergarten Roundup will be held on April 29<sup>th</sup>. If you have a student of kindergarten age we are asking for you to call the school, 328-4581, and schedule a time to register them and have your child participate in some assessments.

The school board discussed the need for additional help in areas around the school and are putting together a list of those willing to help with reading, math, other academic areas, helping with classes or activities (FFA, sports activity workers, Earth Day), or other areas you have an expertise. If you would contact a board member or call the school with your expertise the board will keep a list. Thanks in advance for your help.

Board of Trustees News by Kayce Arthun, Board Chairperson

Greetings from your Absarokee Board of Trustees!

Spring is in the air and new life abounds everywhere you look. Spring is a busy time at the school as spring testing and the 4th quarter are in full swing, extra-curricular competitions are taking place and the final push of the school year is here. With a nationwide shortage of educators, it has become increasingly challenging to find teachers to fill open positions. Ideally, schools would love to hire veteran, certified teachers for every position that becomes available; however, as I write this (03/17/22) the Montana Office of Public Instruction currently has over 600 educator roles open for hire in the state of Montana. Hiring educators has become a daunting task. With those odds, school districts are having to think outside the box to fill positions. We must at times look to professionally develop our own or hire within the other parameters that the state has given us in regards to certification. In the state of Montana, you may teach with the following certifications:

- Have a bachelor's degree with an endorsement in early childhood education, elementary education, middle school education, secondary education, K-12 education, P-12 education or special education. This will give you a Class 2 Standard Certificate which is primarily used for beginning teachers with a bachelor's degree who have completed an accredited teacher preparation program.
- There is also a Class 1 Professional Certificate, which requires three years of successful K-12 teaching experience and a master's
- Montana also has an alternative certification, which is a Class 5 alternative license which lasts for three years while a candidate completes a valid teacher preparation program and/or requisite coursework. Those with a Class 5 License sign a Plan of Professional Intent agreeing to complete their deficient requirements within 3 years.

With each position that becomes available, we are working diligently as a district to recruit and retain qualified individuals. However; at times both in the present and the past we have been unable to fill the position with a Class 1 or Class 2 certification so we are having to rely on the Class 5 Alternative certification. We do not do this lightly. When we hire under the Class 5, we are making certain that the Plan of Professional Intent is clearly defined and followed. We are supporting these individuals with mentors from both in and out of the district, professional development and any other tool we can to support them to be successful educators as they work towards their certification. We understand the concerns that may come from this practice and that it can be confusing, so please reach out to the administration or myself if you have questions.

On May 3, we will be coming to you as a district asking you to continue funding at the current level through a levy request. So, what does that mean exactly? Please see the chart below:

As you can see, with passage of the levy our budgets will only slightly increase from FY2022 to FY2023; however, without passage we will lose approximately \$83,649.36 from our current funding levels. That type of deficit makes it challenging to maintain our staff and programs at the current level. We understand and appreciate the fact that passing the levy will increase your taxes. The elementary levy will increase the taxes on a home with a market value of \$100,000 by approximately \$3.57 and on a home with a market value of \$200,000 by approximately \$7.13. The high school levy will increase the taxes on a home with a market value of \$100,000 by approximately \$3.20 and on a home with a market value of \$200,000 by approximately \$6.40. With today's current climate we know asking you to pay more taxes is a burden; however, we ask that you consider doing so to allow us to continue to maintain our current programs and staff. #### We're "Roundin Up" Kindergartners for Absarokee Elementary School next fall!

Absarokee Elementary School has set the annual Kindergarten Roundup date for **Friday, April 29th** in the **Absarokee Elementary School building.** Testing takes approximately 1 hour and **appointments are necessary** in order for your child to participate. Please call the elementary school at 328-4581 to register your child.

To enroll in kindergarten, children must be 5 years old on or before September 10, 2022. Absarokee Elementary School offers full day Kindergarten only. Parents need to bring a photocopy of the child's **birth certificate and immunization** records to the Roundup.

The purpose of the Kindergarten Roundup is to assess children's readiness for kindergarten and screen their hearing, vision, and speech. Additionally, it serves as preregistration for our school so that staff will be better prepared for school in the fall.

#### Absarokee Teams Excel at Science Bowl by Catherine Frazer

The Big Sky Regional Science Bowl competitions were held on March 10 and March 11. This is a face paced quiz bowl competition with questions from math, physics, chemistry, biology, energy, and earth and space science. This year's competition was held virtually over Zoom, which makes it different and difficult, but the Absarokee teams did great.

In the middle school competition there were 12 teams, including 2 from Absarokee. Both teams survived the preliminary rounds and made it to the elimination round of the top 8. Team 2 (Josie Thomsen, Mackenzie Wood, and Hayden Gunderson) ended up in a tie

for 5th place overall. Team 1 (Will Barnett, Tristan Russell, Cooper Hoines, and August Baker) made it to the round of 4, and finished 3rd overall. They will receive a trophy and medals soon. They were the only Class C school in the final 4, competing against Belgrade, North Middle School (Great Falls) and Saint Francis (Billings).

In the high school competition one team from Absarokee competed in a field of 6 much larger schools. The AHS team was Adree Langley, Nila Dawson, Avery Gates, Allison Howes and Dillon Ferster. Tom Murphy helped out as an alternate. The AHS team did very well in the preliminary rounds, but was eliminated in the first knockout round when the questions were especially difficult.

These teams were coached by Chris Gunderson and Catherine Frazer and had been practicing during lunch for the past two months.

This year's Science Bowls were bittersweet for Ms. Frazer who will be retiring this year. She has coached the middle school teams for 17 years, and the high school teams for 22 years.

Be it resolved this 14th day of March, 2022 that the above resolution was presented at a regular school board meeting and adopted by the Board of Trustee of the Absarokee High School District.

This document must also document the District's expected use of its Building Reserve/State Major Maintenance levies and associated funding. The District expects to use those proceeds to partially fund improvements listed in the annual Facilities Condition Report that the District maintains in the High School Office as well as operational costs of school safety. The District estimates that funding structure will generate approximately \$53,760 during the 2022-23 school year, with a net cost of 45,559 or 2.78 mills.
